## **Morning Arrival**

The safe arrival of our students is a top priority for the staff at Julie Payette. Between 7:45 and 8:00, the bus drop off, kiss and ride, and crosswalks, and playground are all supervised. However, at 8:05 teachers need to leave their assignments to greet their students, leaving the parking lot and playground unsupervised. If you choose to drive your children to school, please have them here before 8:00 am so that they are safe as they enter the school, that they are on time for class and are present for the morning announcements.

### Late Arrival

Being on time for school is an important first step in the pathway to academic success. Being on time;

- Demonstrates that you are diligent and dependable.
- Indicates that you honor your commitments and you can be trusted.
- Shows that you have respect for other people and that you care as much about their time as your own.
- Builds self-confidence and success.

When students are late for school, the following problems may occur:

- They miss part of the class, and may miss something really important.
- They disrupt the class and make it harder for others to work.

## **Change in the Routine**

We would like to remind parents **to send a note to the homeroom teacher or phone the office** regarding anything out of your child's ordinary daily routine. This would include information such as students not taking the bus home on a particular day, dismissal for appointments, or a child going out for lunch with a parent or friend. In addition, please let us know ahead of time if you are aware your child is going to absent, including celebrations for religious holidays.

It can be confusing to a child if their routine changes from day to day so we ask that you try to establish a regular routine for your child. We are also asking you to please avoid calling the office at the end of the day when it is often quite busy to make last minute changes to your child's dismissal routine. **Children should come to school knowing what to do at the end of the day. No surprises please!** 

#### **Indoor shoes - REMINDER**

All students are reminded of the need to reserve one pair of shoes with non-marking soles for indoor use only. These are necessary to participate in indoor gym classes and assemblies as well as to maintain a level of safety within the school. **One should not be travelling the halls in sock feet or be caught in a fire drill with inappropriate footwear. Students need to be conscious of this rule, especially when the hallways are wet and slippery in the winter with snow and water.** Keep one pair of shoes for indoor use only.

## Healthy Snacks for Recess/Lunch

With an increasing awareness of healthy snacks in elementary schools, we recommend that students bring nonsugar snacks for recess and lunch. Some suggestions for healthy snacks: yoghurt cup or tube, cheese string, whole grain crackers, milk pudding cup, fruit or vegetable slices and rice crackers.

## **Head Lice**

As you may be aware, head lice is a common reoccurring problem particularly when large numbers of children are together (schools, clubs, daycares). When the school learns of a case of head lice, parents of the class are notified by letter and given information about checking and treatment. Please stress to your children not to exchange clothing, brushes, combs and especially toques with other children. This reduces the chance of spreading the

head lice. Please check your child's head every week. Watch for itching behind the ears or in the nape of the neck. If you have any questions, please call the local health unit, says a Durham Region Health Department Fact Sheet on lice, which can be found on their website. The fact sheet includes information on what to look for and how to check children's heads for lice. Before returning to class please report to the office.

#### **IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION**

The safety of our students is the most important priority for us at Julie Payette. It is for this reason that we remind you of our expectations for using the parking lot.

- 1. We strongly encourage you to take advantage of the bussing that is available to you. This will greatly reduce the number of cars that access our parking lot every morning and afternoon.
- 2. If you do drive your children to school, please use the Kiss n' Ride lane. DO NOT drop your children off on Garden Street. This is extremely dangerous.
- 3. The Kiss n' Ride lane is a MOVING LANE. Drivers are not allowed to park cars there to walk their children to class. If you need to park, please use a designated parking spot.
- 4. Always signal your intentions as you merge into and out of the Kiss n' Ride lane.
- 5. When you enter the parking lot, KEEP LEFT. Only busses and emergency vehicles are permitted to use the lanes to the right.
- 6. Crosswalks are supervised from 7:45 to 8:00 every morning. To ensure that your children may safely cross the bus lane, please ensure that you drop them off at school BEFORE 8:00.
- 7. DRIVE SLOWLY while in the parking lot and BE PATIENT.
- 8. Only park in DESIGNATED PARKING SPOTS.
- 9. When exiting the parking lot, watch for pedestrians crossing the entrance on the sidewalk.

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## Flu Season

As flu season approaches, we would like to remind our school community of the simple steps that can be taken to protect oneself from the influenza virus.

- Consider getting a flu shot. You can also obtain a flu vaccine from your healthcare provider, at a walkin clinic or certain participating pharmacies.
- Clean your hands often using soap and warm water or use an alcohol based hand sanitizer.
- Do not share personal items (i.e., drinks, lip products, unwashed mouthpieces and musical instruments).
- Keep hard surfaces clean such as keyboards, doorknobs, tables, toys and phones.
- Stay at home if you are sick. Staying at home will help stop the spread of the flu to co-workers, chil-
