REMEMBRANCE DAY

This year we marked Remembrance Day in a different fashion than previous years. We held a virtual ceremony which highlighted contributions from each class. A HUGE thank you to all classes for their thoughtful submissions and to Mrs. Atkinson for putting it all together. We remarked how, despite the fact that we could not all physically be together, we were able to come together virtually where all students were represented in the ceremony.





We also had the pleasure and honour of having Major Raphael Mackenzie speak to some of our junior classes. Major Mackenzie joined the Canadian Armed Forces in 2007. He has spent the majority of his career as a paratrooper or parachute infantry officer and has 53 tactical parachute descents on record (as you can imagine, the kids thought this was just amazing!). He is currently posted to the Canadian Forces College in Toronto where he is doing the Joint Command Staff Program and completing a Masters in Defense Studies. He patiently answered dozens of questions from the students. Major Mackenzie was an eloquent and truly inspirational speaker that clearly showed his love for our country and freedom. After the session, the

students created word activities where they shared words that came to mind when they think of Remembrance Day. Thank you again Major Mackenzie for spending time with us and furthering our learning.

A GLIMPSE INTO CLASSROOMS

As this year is different than any other and we cannot welcome you into the building as we normally would, we wanted to give you a glimpse into classes and the school through our "Updates from School". We hope that you will enjoy seeing what we have been up to! (a)

In October, the grade 5/6 classes of Mme Gibb and Mr. Ochran were fortunate enough to have a virtual, live presentation from Ontario Tech University! It was run by outreach volunteers and they develop, test and maintain curriculum-aligned, hands-on/minds-on workshops, which they deliver for classrooms and community groups across Canada! The program they participated in was called *The Bone Zone* and it aligned with their current science units. The kids discovered how our skeletal system provides protection, support and movement. They then made a model hand and tested it for strength and stability (gr 5 human body unit). They also spoke about adaptations and various bone structures in mammals and vertebrates (gr 6 biodiversity unit). Students were able to tell us:

- ~ how many bones are in the human body (206 in an adult)
- ~ how many bones in the hand (14 in fingers & 5 in palm)
- ~ the names of the bones (3 phalanges/finger and 2 phalanges in the thumb & 5 metacarpal bones in palm).

What a great learning opportunity for our JPPS students!

PARKING LOT

A reminder that our parking lot remains closed to all traffic except buses at entry and dismissal. We have seen an increase in parents arriving before the buses arrive and then leaving while the buses are trying to depart. The buses are on a tight schedule and each time a car is added to the line trying to exit the school, it delays our buses. As such, we would respectfully ask you continue to adhere to the expectation that vehicles entering and exiting the lot is only allowed once all buses have cleared. RECESS

Recess continues to be a challenge for many of our students as they are limited in what they can do outside. We continue to work on providing them with different ideas of games that they can play at recess. We are looking to create classroom bags (large IKEA bags) which would be assigned to each homeroom. The homeroom class would be responsible for their bag and would be able to use the equipment outdoors within their cohort. They would, of course, have to wash/sanitize hands before and after use of the equipment. If you have any large IKEA bags or gently used items such as soccer balls, soft foam balls, scoops, hula hoops, pool noodles etc. that you would like to donate to the school, please call the school to let us know. Indoor recess can also be a challenge for students with the new safety protocols as they cannot play in groups and/or share equipment. As such, we are requesting that students have something with them in their backpack that they can do on their own during inclement weather recesses. Some ideas of activities would be as follows: independent reading books, Soduko, colouring, sketch books, cards, container of lego, origami, rainbow loom or embroidery floss for bracelets etc.

VISITORS TO THE SCHOOL

In order to keep everyone safe, whenever possible, we are limiting visitors to the school. As such, unscheduled visitors, along with family members child(ren) may not be able to enter the school without previous arrangements. LUNCH PROTOCOLS

We have seen an increase in students at the intermediate level leaving school for lunch and going into the community. In our effort to keep students with their cohorts during the school day our expectation is that all students will stay at school for lunch, unless they are going home. If you would like your child to go home for lunch each day, please contact the school office to make arrangements. Please note that students should come prepared with their lunch each day. Students will not be allowed to have lunches ordered to the school. As always, we appreciate that there can be emergency situations where an exception must be made. Should this be needed, please contact the school ahead of time.

ACCES TO THE SCHOOL

As we make every attempt to minimize outside traffic into our school, we need to ask for your assistance. Please make sure that your child has all of their necessary items each day when coming to school, as access to the school is largely by appointment.

It is essential that your child arrives at school on time and enters the building with their cohort. If your child is late, they will need to enter the building through the main entrance, give their name and class, they will be marked as late and will proceed directly to their classroom.
